# **Goodbye to Another River**

If you have never had the opportunity to read "Goodbye to a River" by John Graves, you owe it to yourself to find a copy as soon as possible and enjoy it. Mr. Graves was saying goodbye, about 50 years ago, to a section of the Brazos River where several dams were to be built. We are being forced to say goodbye to our favorite section of the San Marcos River. The problem on the San Marcos has nothing to do with the Corps of Engineers; the problem here is that a whole lot of people are getting very drunk while tubing the river and their misbehavior is making it impossible for other folks to use the river.

Unless you have visited this river recently on a warm summer afternoon, you simply have no idea how bad things have become. But to give you an example of a particularly bad day - the Sunday afternoon of Labor Day Weekend 2014 - we had over 7,000 tubers most of them very inebriated - tubing past our campground (San Marcos River Retreat; just downstream of Westerfield Crossing). We knew it was going to be bad, so we were closed to the public as was my neighbor, TG Canoes and Kayaks. There was no way to get a canoe or kayak down the river, and we had offered our gravel bar and campground to the Caldwell County Sheriff's Department so they could set up a command center to "keep the peace" on the river. They had a helicopter on site, as well as an ambulance and an air-conditioned command center.

The tubers were on their best behavior while they tubed past our gravel bar; after all, the word got out that there was a major police presence there. But a few folks who braved the river in kayaks (to monitor the situation) told me that if you paddled a hundred yards or so upstream of the command center, the party was in full swing - with topless girls performing for beer and jello shots and with crack pipes in abundance. We have seen an increase lately in the number of inflatable sex dolls on the river; and of course, almost every group seems to have a floating boom box blasting x-rated rap music.

The tubing season started out with a "bang" last Memorial Day Weekend. It was late Saturday afternoon when a drunken tuber girl passed out on our gravel bar. Then, an opportunistic tuber guy came along, threw her over his shoulder and carried her into the middle of our campground, right in front of a group of families who had ignored my warnings to stay away that weekend. He proceeded to rape her (it's rape if the victim is unconscious, whether she agrees to file charges later or not). The families stopped him in mid stroke, the police were called, and it looks like he may eventually be indicted.

Things got so bad that I was forced to hire my own security force to keep people from taking over the gravel bar (it was not unusual for there to be 100 drunken tubers on the bar on a warm day - with lots of shotgunning of beer, rap music and some interesting dancing). Lets just say that things are not conducive to operating a Christian youth camp.

The river and its banks belong to the state; so our state is allowing this non stop party to take place on its property. If any individual or entity had regular parties like this they would be shut down for disturbing the peace. I have proposed that the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department create a "linear state park" on this section of river. Other states have done it. The state already owns the land, and it would be a park that requires no superintendent, no facilities and no employees. The main thing it would change is that the public display or consumption of alcohol would be prohibited. The party would end. There is legislation introduced this session to create a Water Oriented Recreation District to help solve our problem. But I am concerned that such a district will only tax all river users to collect some money for clean ups and police. All it takes is a short drive on River Road on the Guadalupe to see that a WORD won't stop the party. I fear that it may be time to say goodbye to another river.

**Hidalgo Falls Fund:** Since April 2001, canoeists, kayakers, and river lovers have been donating money and time to purchase and maintain 13 acres of land at Hidalgo Falls on the

Brazos River. Now there is a restroom and camping area for TRPA members to enjoy. For more info see the TRPA website.

**River Road Fund:** The State of Texas is considering allowing an interstate type highway to be constructed across the Guadalupe River along River Road. We have set up a fund to help the locals defeat this project. You can read more at: http://www.save-river-road.net/

**Rockcrusher Fund**: Several years ago a company called Wheatcraft applied for an air quality permit for a rockcrusher on the banks of the Guadalupe River and right in the middle of the town of Center Point. Partly due to our opposition, that company has temporarily withdrawn their permit application. The fund is still maintained in the event that the issue comes up again.

**Center Point Lions Park:** A group in Center Point are interested in improving a small park on the banks of the Guadalupe River.

**Mike Ash Memorial:** A fund maintained to remember an old friend of Texas Rivers. The money is periodically donated to projects that we feel Mike would have liked to support.

**San Marcos River:** There are several tubing operators on the San Marcos River that are particularly offensive when it comes to trash, noise and bad behavior. Money is being earmarked to save the river.

**Don Greene Plaque:** This past August, our good friend Don Greene passed away after a brief bout with pancreatic cancer. Don devoted his life to protecting the rivers of Texas and introducing people to those rivers. He was particularly devoted to the protection and preservation of Buffalo Bayou in Houston. The TRPA is proud to participate in the purchase of a memorial plaque for Don. The plaque will be placed near Buffalo Bayou in the near future.



## In Memory of Don Greene

Don Greene was a staunch protector of Texas Rivers and Bayous. He had a passion for environmental education and was committed to the protection and conservation of the rivers and streams of Texas. Over the years, he used his love of rivers to introduce thousands of young Texans to the great outdoors in the canyons of the Big Bend, New Mexico, and Mexico. But his heart was always on the Buffalo Bayou. He served as president of the Buffalo Bayou Preservation Association and as a member of the Rivers Conservation Advisory Board for the state of Texas.

He was always opening our eyes to the wonders of nature – the beaver of Buffalo Bayou, the night herons of Braes Bayou, the footprints of the water birds and the raccoons on a sand bar. He explored and loved the green ribbons of life that cut across an often brown and dehydrated landscape called Texas.

As you walk along the banks or paddle the waters of the Buffalo Bayou, take a moment to give thanks for those who have fought to preserve it.

# San Marcos River Clean Up 30th Annual - March 7, 2015

On Saturday, March 7, folks from all over Texas will be participating in the world's longest river clean up. We will be picking up trash along the entire length of the San Marcos River (approximately 90 miles). Everyone is urged to help. If vou are unable to participate in the water, we need volunteers to work the banks of the river, especially at parks and highway crossings. The upper sections of the river will require the most attention, and the short mileages set for these sections reflect this. Furthermore, the river becomes less accessible and more hazardous as one goes downstream. For that reason, novice boaters should volunteer for the upper sections. The lower river, from Luling to Gonzales, has several long sections with few bridge crossings so we are asking canoe racers (especially teams that have competed in the Texas Water Safari) to volunteer for sections below Luling. Everyone participating in this event is invited to camp free at either Shady Grove Campground/ Spencer Canoes or at the San Marcos River Retreat for the weekend. Starting at 6 p.m. on Saturday evening there will be a meal provided by the San Marcos River Foundation at Shady Grove/Spencer Canoes. Canoe racers paddling the lower river will meet at Palmetto Park at 8:30 a.m. Everyone paddling the sections of river between the Thompson's Island and Luling will meet at 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning at the San Marcos River Retreat. Persons working the upper sections will meet at City Park in San Marcos at 9:30 a.m.
